

Q1. Respondent role (N=57)






The Equity Flex meeting was great and I implemented what I learned to my classes this semester!

One that I will remember is the fall walking tour through the IVC gardens. Our opening speaker in the spring was inspirational.

Coming into this next year, I'm interested in the development of effective habits that support creative, healthy, team productivity at work.

I would like to have access to ESL specific workshops on listening, speaking, grammar, pronunciation, etc. And not by publishers/sales reps but actual teachers with first hand classroom experience.

There is often a lag for showing completion/credit after completing and evaluating a course. Perhaps a streamlined roster that can be completed without paper/hard copies.

The Comprehensible Classroom website and their AcquisItion Academy could be a good resource for workshops on teaching with a comprehensible input focus in language classrooms.

Often, 2023 Kentfield feels like 1933 Germany. What would we want our equivalents in 1933 to have taught their students about the rise of the Nazis? We can't ignore the rise of authoritarian forces in the US with thoughts such as, "Come on, Dave Patterson! Be practical! There is not much COM faculty can do about DeSantis and his ilk. I teach math!" "Or, "Pleeeeze! I teach real estate, and I have nothing to offer my students about authoritarian forces. Get real!" I feel like we would be right to critique our equivalents in 1933 Germany lower division education if they said, "You know, I am a biology instructor. I focus on my students. This troublemaker Hitler and his ilk are obnoxious and probably dangerous, but I have nothing to do with them. In fact, I wouldn't know where to begin with my students. I'm not an economist, or a political scientist, or a historian. I teach botany, for heaven sake." I feel like COM needs to mobilize against totalitarian tendencies in the US in a more intentional and explicit way.

I love the idea of departments collaborating and campuses intertwining more. IVC really doesn't get the recognition it deserves.
